I REMEMBER

Last November, I had the honor of being elected to another term as councilmember to the third most populated city in Los Angeles County, Santa Clarita. After a long campaign and a short period of celebration, my wife and I decided to travel back East to visit family and friends. Naturally, that also included a trip to Bordentown. We stood in front of the Cadet Statue while I bored my wife with story after story of my time there. Then we walked to St. Mary's Church taking the same route we cadets took many years ago on our way to Sunday Mass. At St. Mary's we prayed. I thanked God for the great blessing I received when He took me out of a NYC ghetto and put me in the hands of Dean Smith, Mr. Borst and the faculty, staff and cadet corps of BMI. It was at BMI that I learned the leadership skills that have served me well in life and I am truly grateful for the time I spent there.

I remember that in late 1959 the basketball team was warming up before practice. Colonel John Roosma, who had just replaced the irreplaceable Colonel Herbert T. Benz as Commandant of Cadets, walked on the court in his military uniform and asked me if he could have a shot. He was almost 60 and I hoped he would not hurt himself. He took two shots and missed badly on both. He smiled at me and said, "I'm a bit rusty." I smiled and thought, "Here is a man who dreamed of someday playing basketball." Many years later, in 1981, I visited the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, MA. To my amazement, Mr. Johnny Roosma was an inductee, having been considered the best college basketball player of his era. Colonel Roosma was a living example of "Rather Be Than Seem."
